

TISSUE DONATION

This leaflet provides information about tissue donation following a death

WHAT IS TISSUE DONATION?

Many people are not aware that hundreds of lives are saved or improved each year by donated tissues such as heart valves and corneas. It is likely that up to ten people can be helped by the donation from one donor.

WHICH TISSUES CAN BE DONATED?

Eyes

The clear part of the eye (the 'cornea') or the white part (the 'sclera') of the eye can be transplanted to help restore the sight of patients with damaged, diseased or injured eyes and patients born with eye defects.

Heart valves

Two valves, or small patches from a valve, can be transplanted to save the lives of babies and children born with heart defects, or they can be given to adults suffering with diseased or infected valves.

Human tissue can also be donated for scientific and medical research

Brain and spinal cord tissue may be donated to help scientists understand conditions such as Parkinson's and Alzheimer's disease and to develop new treatments.

CAN ANYONE BECOME A TISSUE DONOR?

Most people up to 75 years of age can be a tissue donor. To ensure that all donated tissues are safe, our Tissue Co-ordinator will need to ask you about the donor's medical and lifestyle history (similar to questions for blood donors).

WHAT ARE THE TIME LIMITS FOR TISSUE DONATION?

Time limits for eye tissue donation are up to 30 hours after death; however heart valve donation is possible within 48 hours.

CAN YOU TELL IF THE PATIENT HAS BEEN A TISSUE DONOR?

Throughout the donation process, the donor is treated with respect and dignity. After donation, our specialist team will ensure that the donor maintains a natural appearance. You may see your loved one after the donation if you wish.


WILL TISSUE DONATION INTERFERE WITH FUNERAL ARRANGEMENTS?

No, donation should not delay any funeral arrangements.

CAN WE FIND OUT WHAT HAPPENS AFTER DONATION?

Yes, we will write to you to provide you with information after the donation and give you our contact details.

We can then later give you information about the transplant patients and the research your loved one has helped.



HOW DO WE AGREE TO TISSUE DONATION AFTER DEATH?


It is still possible **after death** for the person legally responsible for your relative to give permission for tissue donation to go ahead. Our Tissue Co-ordinator may arrange to call you to explain how this may take place.
