# Important information about your erythromycin medicine

# Information for patients

# How to take your medicine

Erythromycin is an antibiotic. Take the dose as directed on the label.

# Important instructions

- To avoid re-infection, do not have any sexual contact (even with a condom) until both you and your partner have completely finished this treatment.
- Before you start taking these tablets let your doctor know if you have any other medical condition or if you are taking any other medicines (including over the counter remedies). This is because erythromycin can interact with many other medicines.
- It is safe to take this medicine if you are pregnant.
- Moderate amounts of alcohol will not interfere with this treatment.

#### Side effects

- You may experience nausea and stomach discomfort.
  It may help to take these tablets after food.
- There are other less common side effects. Please let your doctor know if you are troubled by any new symptoms or have any concerns.

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# Contraception

Remember, to avoid re-infection do not have any sexual contact (even with a condom) until both you and your partner have completely finished this treatment.

If you have taken your contraceptive correctly and have no side effects while taking your antibiotics, your contraceptive pill/patch/ring will be effective after the treatment has finished. If you are ill while taking the antibiotics (vomiting or severe diarrhoea) you should use condoms in addition to your pill/patch/ring for 7 days after you have finished the antibiotics.
