Introduction

This leaflet is about the people who will look after you during your care – the Gynae Oncology Cancer Multidisciplinary Team at Oxford University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust.

The Gynae Oncology Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT)

We are a group of healthcare professionals with a specialist interest, knowledge and expertise in the care of patients with a gynaecological cancer.

Our team includes the following.

- **Specialist Surgeons** specialise in treating cancer with surgery.
- Specialist Medical Oncologists / Clinical Oncologists specialise in treating cancer with chemotherapy (systemic anti-cancer therapies) and radiotherapy.
- **Pathologists** interpret and diagnose the changes caused by disease in tissues and body fluids.
- Radiologists specialise in diagnosing and treating disease, using medical imaging techniques such as X-rays, computed tomography (CT), magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), nuclear medicine, positron emission tomography (PET), fusion imaging and ultrasound.
- Clinical Nurse Specialists (CNS)/Key Workers provide expert advice related to specific cancer conditions or treatment pathways.
- MDT Coordinator coordinates the administration of our work.

MDT Meeting

We meet every Monday afternoon. We discuss your individual case at important points in your care, such as diagnosis, after surgery, or after chemotherapy or radiotherapy.

We discuss your case history, scan images, pathology results and any other relevant information and work out an appropriate plan for your treatment or care. We will discuss this with you in clinic, on the ward or occasionally over the telephone.

Clinical Nurse Specialists/Key Workers

Clinical Nurse Specialists (CNS) are senior nurses who work as core members of our team.

They have specific specialist knowledge and experience of patients diagnosed with a gynaecological cancer.

They work closely with members of the team involved in your care, such as the surgeons, medical oncologists and clinical oncologists, and liaise closely with other healthcare professionals who may be looking after you.

A CNS will be your Key Worker – your main point of contact with the hospital – and will support you through your cancer pathway.

They can offer information, support and advice about investigations and treatment at any stage of your care, for example:

- support for your relatives or carers
- advice about physical symptoms such as pain, nausea or fatigue
- advice about surgery or other treatments such as chemotherapy or radiotherapy
- advice about financial support
- symptom control
- advice and support when living with and beyond a cancer diagnosis.
