Information about your placement

F Ward is the Trauma ward at the Horton General Hospital in Banbury. We are part of the Oxford Trauma Unit. Many of our patients are elderly and have sustained fragility fractures, most commonly hip fractures. It is well recognised that these patients have complex medical needs so in 2011 a Consultant Ortho-geriatrician was appointed in order to ensure that all elements of best practice were achieved for this vulnerable patient population. Best practice also includes aspects of nursing practice. F Ward has been ranked in the top five (out of 175 hospitals) for the past seven consecutive years in the National Hip Fracture Report. This is a demonstration of the high standard of care received by patients, and for which staff should be justly proud.

Key learning opportunities in the area

- All basic nursing care for competencies can be met on this ward
- Nursing pre and post-operative patients follow the patient on their journey from pre-op to theatre and recovery and back to the ward
- Nursing patients with medical/trauma conditions
- Looking after patients with various stages of dementia
- A more specialised treatment of fractures to include traction/splints/thoracic braces/collar care and the internal fixation of fractures

- Early: 07:00 14:30 (half hour break)
- Late: 13:30 21:30 (half hour break)
- Long Day: 07:00 21:30 (two half hour breaks)
- Night: 21:00 07:30 (one hour break)

Therapy student information

Occupational Therapy

- Carry out initial assessments client-centred approach
- Assess activities of daily living
 - Wash and dress
 - Kitchen assessments
 - Transfers: bed chair toilet
- Assess for equipment essential for discharge
- Assess cognition
- Encourage patients to get dressed in day clothes
- Liaise with family members
- Facilitate safe discharges along with MDT

Physiotherapy

- New patient assessment and start of rehabilitation process
- Use of walking aids
- Weight bearing restrictions and techniques
- Day to day ward and gym based rehabilitation
- Discharge planning

Local education programmes in the area

- Ward-based teaching sessions by Clinical Practice Educators
- Ad hoc external Heath Care Product Reps teaching sessions
- Continual teaching combined with practical skills
