Oxford will work with other hospitals in the network to co-ordinate certain treatment, for example, radiotherapy or chemotherapy if you live outside the Oxford area.

Specialist Nurses:

Specialist Nurses are qualified nurses with specialist training and extensive experience. They offer advice and support throughout your diagnosis, treatment and follow-up.

One of the nursing team will act as your key worker during your treatment, which means they are the main point of contact for you, your family and any professionals involved in your care. They can be contacted between 8.00am and 3.30pm, Monday to Friday (excluding bank holidays).

Consultant radiologists:

Radiologists are specialists in examining and interpreting X-rays, CT scans, MRI scans, PET CT and bone scans, as well as other diagnostic tests used to diagnose conditions.

Consultant histopathologists:

Histopathologists are specialists in examining tissue and cells taken from biopsies and other diagnostic samples, to diagnose conditions and types of cancer.

MDT co-ordinator:

The MDT co-ordinator plans the MDT meetings, making sure that you are discussed and the clinical teams have all your medical information.

Bone and Soft Tissue Tumour Service Pathway administrator:

This person will co-ordinate your clinic appointments and send information between the hospitals.

Other members of the MDT:

There are other specialists such as physiotherapists, occupational therapists, dietitians, social workers and research nurses who are part of the extended MDT. You may be referred to these specialists where appropriate.

The MDT meeting

The team of specialists meet every Monday to discuss the diagnosis and treatment plan of individual people. They make sure each person is given the same high standard of care and has the most appropriate investigations and treatment.

What happens after the meeting?

After your case has been discussed in the meeting, the recommendations are recorded on the electronic patient records system (EPR) or in your patient notes.

It is likely that an appointment will be made with your consultant and/or specialist nurse to discuss the outcome with you or you may be offered an appointment to have further investigations. You may bring a friend or relative with you to any of these appointments. In some cases we may need to refer you to another specialist team and the reason for this will be discussed with you.

Communication with you and your GP

Your GP will be informed within 24 hours of you being given your diagnosis and will be copied into any correspondence about your diagnosis, treatment and care.

You will also receive a copy of any correspondence. If you do not understand anything in the letters you receive, please bring them with you to your next appointment and we will be happy to discuss them with you. If you do not wish to receive any correspondence, please speak to your consultant or Specialist Nurse.

Ward rounds

You are very welcome to have a relative or friend with you when you are seen by the doctors on the ward. The ward nurses can let you know when this is most likely to be.

A member of the medical team will see you each day, from Monday to Friday. You will also be seen on those days by a Specialist Nurse, to discuss any questions or concerns you may have.

Out of hours advice

If you are having treatment or have recently had an operation and have an urgent problem related to your condition outside of hours, please contact the last ward you were treated on.

If you are receiving chemotherapy, please use the emergency contact number you have been given or dial 111 (free) to seek advice.
