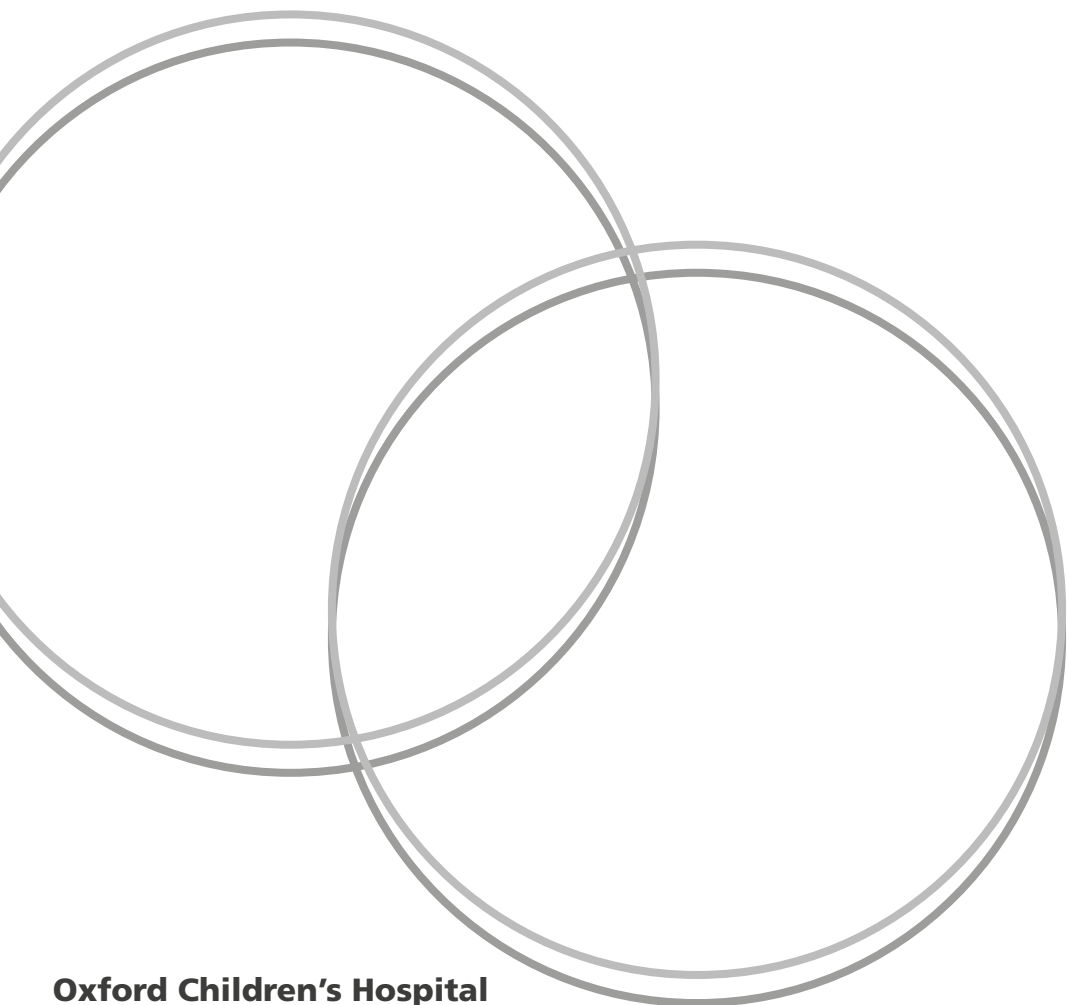

Lisinopril

**Information for
parents and carers**

What is lisinopril?

Lisinopril is in a group of drugs called ACE inhibitors. Lisinopril is used in children with heart problems to lower the blood pressure and help reduce the workload of the heart.

How does it work?

Lisinopril causes the small arteries to relax, reducing the blood pressure and allowing the heart to work more efficiently.

How should it be taken?

It is important lisinopril is taken regularly, as prescribed. This is usually taken once a day. It is available as tablets, 2.5mg, 5mg, 10mg and 20mg which can be dissolved in water and given to young children using an oral syringe or as a suspension dispensed in a strength of 5mg in 5ml. It may be better to give it to your child in the evening in case it causes dizziness, particularly if increasing the dose.

What side effects may occur?

Most children tolerate lisinopril quite well. Some children experience low blood pressure. Skin rashes and changes in the sense of taste (usually for a short time) and sleep disturbances have also been reported. A dry cough or sore throat may also be a problem.

If your child feels dizzy, lying them down will help. If your child experiences any other side effects, please report this to your doctor or Children's Cardiac Nurse Specialist.

Blood tests will be required to monitor kidney function while your child is taking lisinopril.

Further prescriptions will need to be provided by your child's GP.

This medicine should not be stopped without advice from a Doctor.
