

Head Injury Advanced Nurse Practitioner

Information for patients



This leaflet has been written to give you and your relatives information following your head injury. It will tell you about the support you will receive now and any ongoing care you might need.

Clare Sweasey is a Head Injury Advanced Nurse Practitioner. She is a registered nurse with experience in critical care and neuroscience nursing, She worked on the Neurosciences Intensive Care Unit for 8 years and has completed a Bachelor of Science in Neurosciences Critical Care.

She works as part of a team to offer support, information and advice to patients over the age of 16, and their family, who have been admitted to the John Radcliffe Hospital following a head injury.

Clare works closely with the critical care, trauma and neurosciences departments; she also has close links with the rehabilitation units and the acquired brain injury nurses, who are based in the community.

How can the Head Injury Advanced Nurse Practitioner help?

Clare can give you information and advice during your hospital stay and can be contacted after you leave hospital. She will also give support to you and your family.

Clare will be able to make the appropriate referrals for your ongoing care or rehabilitation, if needed, whilst you are either an inpatient or an outpatient. This might include referrals to neurorehabilitation centres or to neuropsychologists.
