

# Your appointment at the Women's Centre Pre-operative Assessment Clinic

**Information for patients**



Welcome to the Women's Centre. This is the beginning of your journey with us, and we hope that this leaflet will answer your questions about what pre-operative assessment is and how you can prepare for it.

## What is pre-operative assessment?

Before your operation we need to make sure you are fit and healthy for an anaesthetic. This means that you will be 'assessed' from a medical and nursing point of view before your operation.

You will be given a pre-operative assessment appointment up to six weeks before your operation date.

## How long will it take?

Please allow a few hours for your pre-operative assessment clinic appointment. Parking can be difficult, so allow plenty of time to get to your appointment. Young children need to be supervised at all times – we recommend that you arrange for them to be looked after by someone else during your appointment.

## Is it necessary?

Completing a pre-operative assessment appointment before you are admitted to hospital for your operation is very important. It means that any problems can be identified and resolved prior to your operation and it therefore reduces the risk of your operation being cancelled on the day of surgery.

If do not attend your pre-operative assessment appointment then your operation will be cancelled or postponed. You cannot have your surgery unless you have been seen in the pre-operative assessment clinic.

## **What to bring with you**

Please bring with you any medicines which you are taking (tablets, eye drops, inhalers etc.).

## **Where do I go?**

The pre-operative assessment clinic is held in the Outpatient Department in the Women's Centre on Level 1. On entering the building, just report to the receptionist and then take a seat. The nurse will call for you.

We also complete telephone appointment assessments depending on your medical history. Please be aware that you may still need to attend our clinic at a later date for pre-operative investigations to be completed.

## **Seeing the pre-assessment nurse**

The pre-operative assessment nurse will take your blood pressure, pulse and temperature. You will also be weighed, your urine checked, and a pregnancy test may be done. The nurse will ask you some questions about your lifestyle, e.g., whether you smoke, drink, or become breathless on exertion; whether you have any difficulties walking or use any aids to help with walking; or whether you have carers to help you at home.

The nurse will also ask you questions about yourself and your general health, and talk to you about any arrangements you may need to make for when you get home after your operation.

The pre-operative assessment clinic is mainly run by nurses but if there is a need for you to see a doctor this will be arranged.

## **Blood and other tests**

We will need to take some blood in order to carry out various tests. We need to know what blood type you are in case you need to have a blood transfusion after your operation. You may need other blood tests, depending on your medical history. You may also have a chest X-ray and an electro-cardiogram (ECG), where small pads are placed on your chest and a tracing of your heartbeat is made.

You will need to go to other departments within the hospital to have these tests done.

If a problem is discovered during your pre-operative assessment (for example, that you have high blood pressure) there may be time to treat it before your operation. If this is not possible, you will be referred back to your GP for further treatment. Your operation may be delayed as a result of this. It is important that you are as fit as possible before you undergo your operation.

## **Refreshments**

There is a League of Friends tea bar in the Women's Centre where you are able to buy filled rolls, hot drinks and confectionary. There are toilets in the Outpatient's Department. There is also a breastfeeding and baby changing room.
