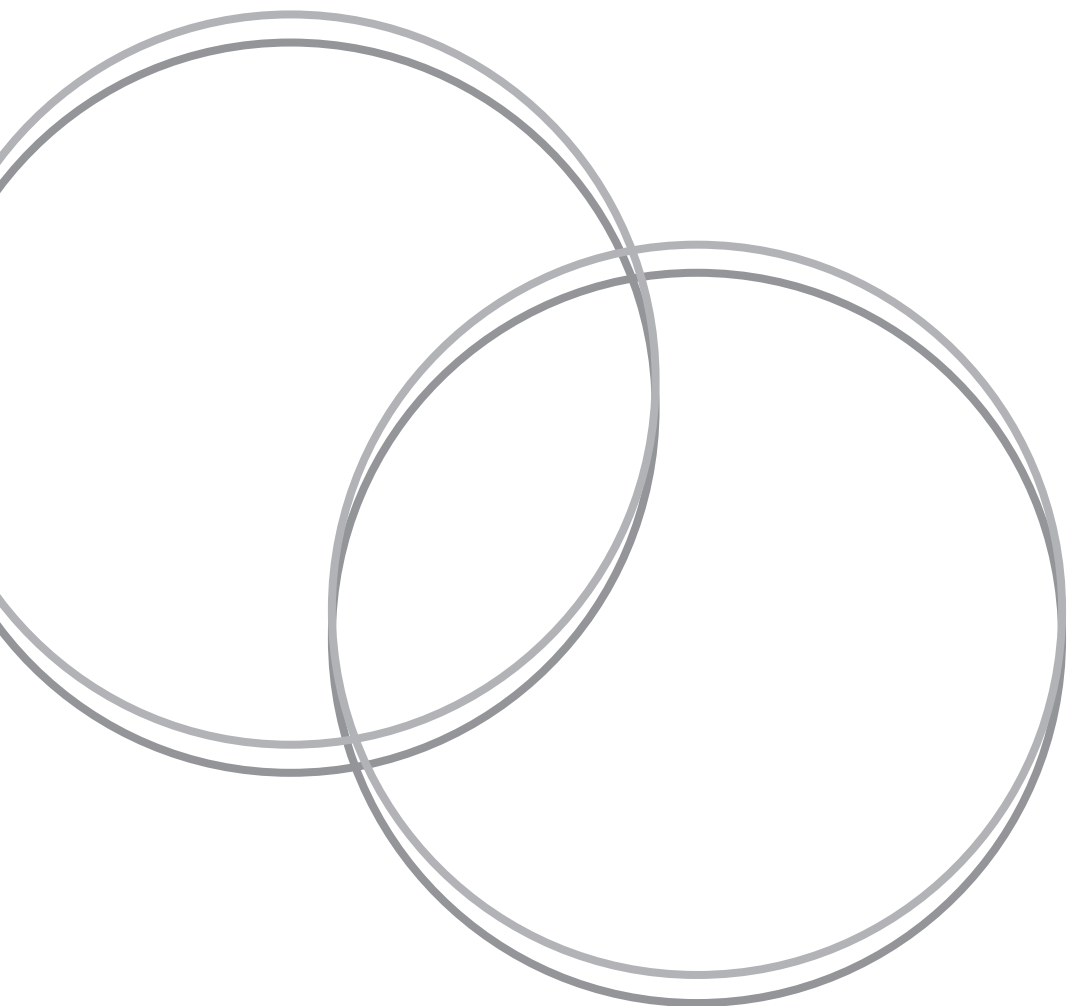

Cancers of the Colon, Rectum and Anus

Information about your care



This leaflet has been designed to give you information about the people who will be involved in your care.

You will be looked after by the Colorectal Multi-Disciplinary Team at the Oxford University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. We hope that this leaflet will be a source of information and help for you.

The Multi-Disciplinary Team [MDT]

This team is made up of a group of healthcare professionals who have a specialist interest, knowledge and expertise in the management of patients with cancers of the colon, rectum and anus.

The team is made up of:

Nurse Specialist

Nurses who have been trained and can provide expert advice related to your cancer conditions or treatment pathways.

MDT Coordinators

Coordinates the administration associated with the work of the MDT and ensures information about your care is disseminated to the appropriate team caring for you.

Surgeons

A doctor who specialises in treating cancer with colorectal surgery.

Medical Oncologists

Doctors who specialise in treating cancer with chemotherapy/ immunotherapy (drug treatment).

Clinical Oncologists

A doctor who specialises in treating cancer with radiotherapy (type of X-ray treatment).

Pathologists

A doctor who interprets and diagnoses changes caused by disease in tissues and body fluids.

Radiologists

A doctor who specialises in diagnosing and treating disease, using medical imaging techniques such as X-rays, computed tomography (CT), magnetic resonance imaging (MRI). Nuclear medicine, positron emission tomography (PET), fusion imaging, and ultrasound.

Gastroenterologists

Doctors who specialise in conditions affecting the bowel.

The MDT Meeting

The MDT meets every Monday morning. Your individual case will be discussed at key points of your care such as diagnosis, after surgery, or after chemotherapy or radiotherapy.

The MDT will discuss your case history, scan images, pathology results and any other relevant information. As a team of specialists they will develop an appropriate plan for your treatment or care. This plan may be discussed with you over the telephone/in clinic or on the ward.

What is a Key Worker / Nurse Specialist?

A key worker coordinates and promotes continuity of care, for example by directing you and your family or carers to relevant information and advice. Although we will assign you a Key Worker, the whole team will help plan and deliver your care. We aim to support you to be as independent as possible and maximise your quality of life.

What is a Specialist Nursing Team?

We are qualified nurses with specialist training and experience in colorectal cancer, who can offer:

- Emotional support to deal with your diagnosis and the future.
- Advice about your surgery, chemotherapy or radiotherapy.
- Information on any investigations you may need.
- Advice about physical symptoms, treatment side-effects and their management throughout your pathway.
- A link with other staff and services involved with your care, now and in the future, including contact details where appropriate.
- Advice and support when living with and beyond a cancer diagnosis including survivorship.

We use Macmillan's Electronic holistic Needs Assessment (eHNA) at www.macmillan.org.uk to help identify your needs; ask your specialist nurse for more information.

Administrators and cancer support workers work alongside the specialist nurses as part of the nursing team to support patients going through a colorectal cancer diagnosis. You will find that they are a core part of your cancer team and can also offer support day-to-day.
